Guidelines for summer school reports

Report content

The report should be send to Anders (abd@imm.dtu.dk) and Aasa (aasa@diku.dk) before the deadline in order to get the remaining 2 ECTS to obtain the full 5 ECTS for the summer school.

We hope that the report will make you reflect on the sparse methods presented at the summer school in relation to your own project or part of your project. This can be obtained by answering questions like: Where can your project benefit from sparse methods? What makes you think that your data might be sparse?

The report should contain the following elements:

- 1. Motivation
 - a. How is your project related to the world?
 - b. What makes it relevant?
- 2. Problem
 - a. What is it specifically you try to solve?
- 3. Sparsity
 - a. Formulate problems that can be solved using sparse representations, and explain the meaning of the sparsity in the context of your problem.
 - b. How can methods presented at the summer school be useful in your project or research field?
 - c. What might bring a solution to the problems in your project or research field?
- 4. Conclusion
 - a. What is the potential contribution from what you learned in the summer school?
 - b. What future works do you see?

This list is a guideline to make the writing of the report easy. It is not intended to make you reveal ideas that you would rather keep to your self for publication later on. So feel free to use the art of writing to make a good report.
